

Homer's Iliad Computer analysis



Homer's *Odyssey* Computer analysis










Satyrus' Euripides Manual analysis







Xenophon's *Memorabilia* Computer analysis





Tacitus' Agricola Manual analysis




Plutarch's Cato Minor Computer analysis





Lucian's *Demonax*Manual analysis



Mark's gospel Manual analysis



Matthew's gospel Manual analysis



Luke's gospel Manual analysis





